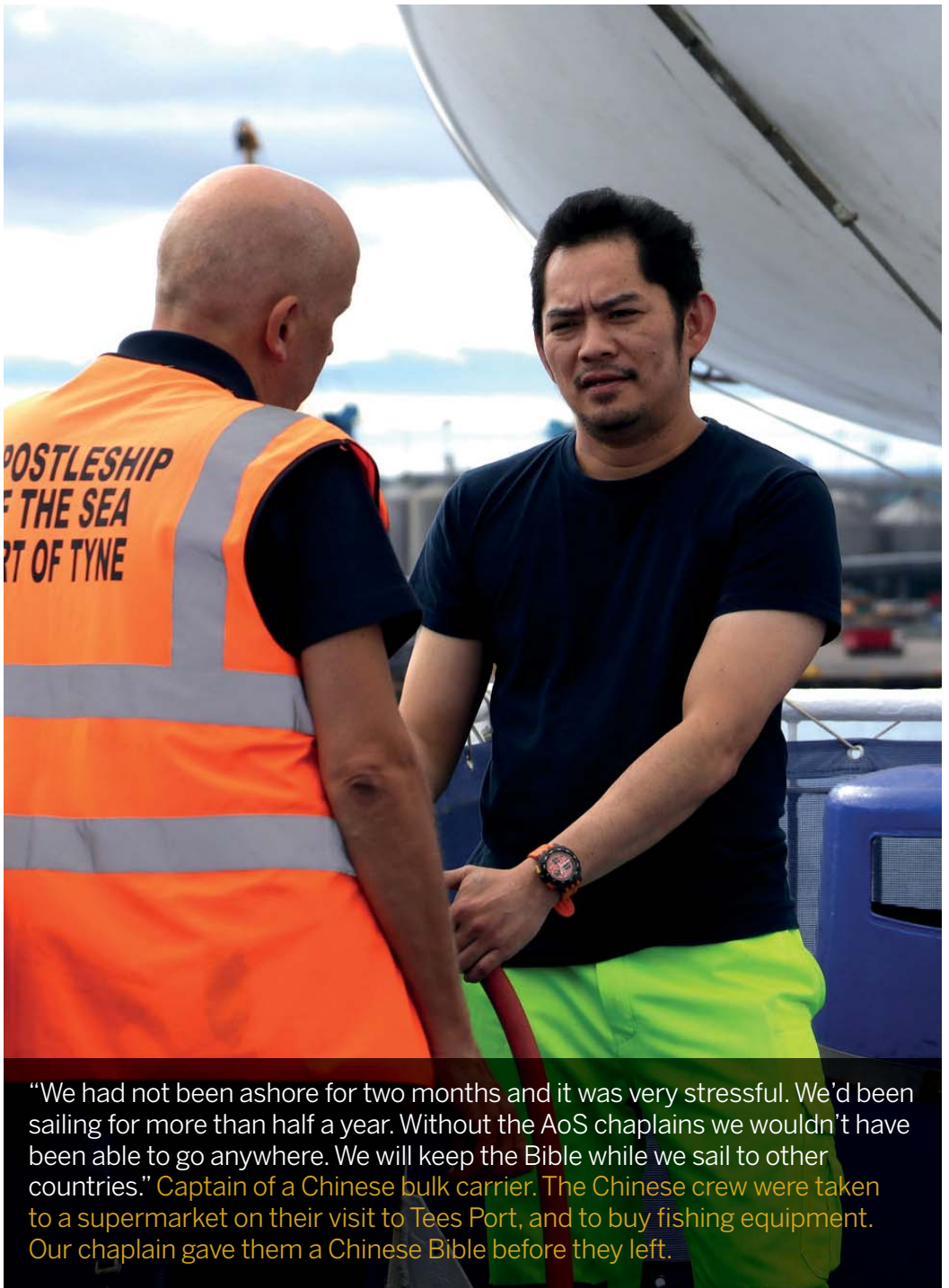

A day in the life of a port chaplain

Anne McLaren has been a Port Chaplain in the Port of Hull for 10 years. With the support of ship visitors, she's visited thousands of ships and supported countless seafarers. Anne leads a team of more than a dozen volunteers and manages the Hull Seafarers' Centre, in King George Dock, open 24 hours a day, every day.





Here Anne gives us a taste of life as a port chaplain.

“There’s no such thing as a typical day, but usually I head to our centre first thing in the morning to meet the volunteers. We check the shipping lists to see what vessels are expected and where. We cover the ports of Hull and Goole, which is 30 miles away, so we arrange where we’re going to spend the day.

“We start visiting the first ships around mid -morning and keep going until we’ve been to them all. I try to visit perhaps three or four ships a day, and it’s the thing I love most about this ministry.

“It’s a great privilege to be able to go to seafarers, bring newspapers and other information and invite them to our centre to talk and listen to them. The important thing is our presence on board. It’s the small things we do, the acts of help and support, that make a difference to the lives of seafarers.

“In the afternoon, I might go back to a ship to take seafarers into town or back to our centre. The building is open 24/7, and seafarers can come any time to use the free Wifi, get tea and coffee, watch TV or just sit in peace and quiet. I might also visit a seafarer in hospital during the afternoon. Often, we become like family for hospitalised seafarers. We visit as often as we can, including at weekends, until they are able to go home to their own families.

“The volunteers and I get together at the centre at the end of the day to de-brief and list the ships we’ve visited. As well as ship visitors, we also have volunteers who clean the centre, sort out technical problems and a million other jobs. I can’t stress enough how important these people are; I couldn’t do my job without them!

“As the day draws to an end I head for home, but my phone is on 24/7 for seafarers to contact me if they need support.”

Every day chaplains visit **four ships** on average

19 chaplains like Anne in Great Britain are visiting ships in **61 ports**

Providing help in crisis around the world

At any one time, our London-based team is coordinating help for dozens of seafarers in crisis. This might mean arranging for a chaplain to visit a sick seafarer in hospital, intervening to ensure seafarers are paid if there's been a delay, or sending chaplains on board following the death of a crew member. It's vital help which makes all the difference to individuals who are far from home, grieving, or feel powerless and scared.

On-board care in a crisis

In March, a Panama-flagged container ship was boarded by pirates who rammed the vessel into an oil tanker. The Russian and Ukrainian crew were terrified. We arranged for our chaplains in the next two ports, one in Nigeria and then Durban, to visit the ship to offer support. We brought toiletries, checked on their wellbeing and were assured that many seafarers had been sent back home to recover.

Responding to crew deaths

The tanker Key Fighter was on route to London from Norway when two seafarers tragically died on board after being exposed to toxic gas. Our chaplain, Wojciech Holub, went on board as soon as possible to support the grieving crew. "One of the dead men was very much a father figure," said Wojciech. "He had been due to retire, and this was his final contract. The crew were terribly distraught and overcome by sadness." At the request of the Filipino crew, Wojciech blessed the ship and prayed with the group. "It was a terrible time, but the seafarers were grateful for our presence and reassured by the pastoral support," added Wojciech.

Visiting seafarers in hospital

Croatian seafarer, Zlatko Kosack (main picture, left), was badly burned while working on an oil tanker near Grangemouth,

Scotland. He was rushed to hospital, needing an urgent skin graft operation. Our chaplain, Deacon Joe O'Donnell, stepped in to help, not only visiting Zlatko but arranging for him to receive home-cooked food, sorting accommodation for Zlatko's wife, and bringing Zlatko a special gift as he celebrated his 50th birthday in a hospital bed! Zlatko said, "Without Joe, the AoS chaplain, this would have been extremely difficult to deal with. We have been shown so much generosity."

When there's no one else to help

When a Tanzanian-flagged vessel arrived in Durban, South Africa, it was infested with rats and cockroaches, and the crew had not been paid for months. Two men needed medical attention, and others urgently needed to send money home. Our AoS chaplain organised a doctor, arranged for the ship to be fumigated, sourced an emergency grant so the crew could buy food and collected clothes and toiletries from local supporters. Eventually the crew was repatriated and paid once the troubled ship had been sold.

Faith on board

More than half of all seafarers are Christians – and when faced with the dangers and loneliness of life at sea, seafarers lean on their faith more than ever. We give spiritual support, including arranging Mass on board, helping seafarers get to church and providing faith resources such as Bibles and prayer books to whoever wants them.

In Tilbury, our chaplain organised a last-minute Mass on board the *Top Trader*. Seafarers rarely get the chance to attend Mass on long voyages, and they cherish the opportunity to be able to practise their faith.

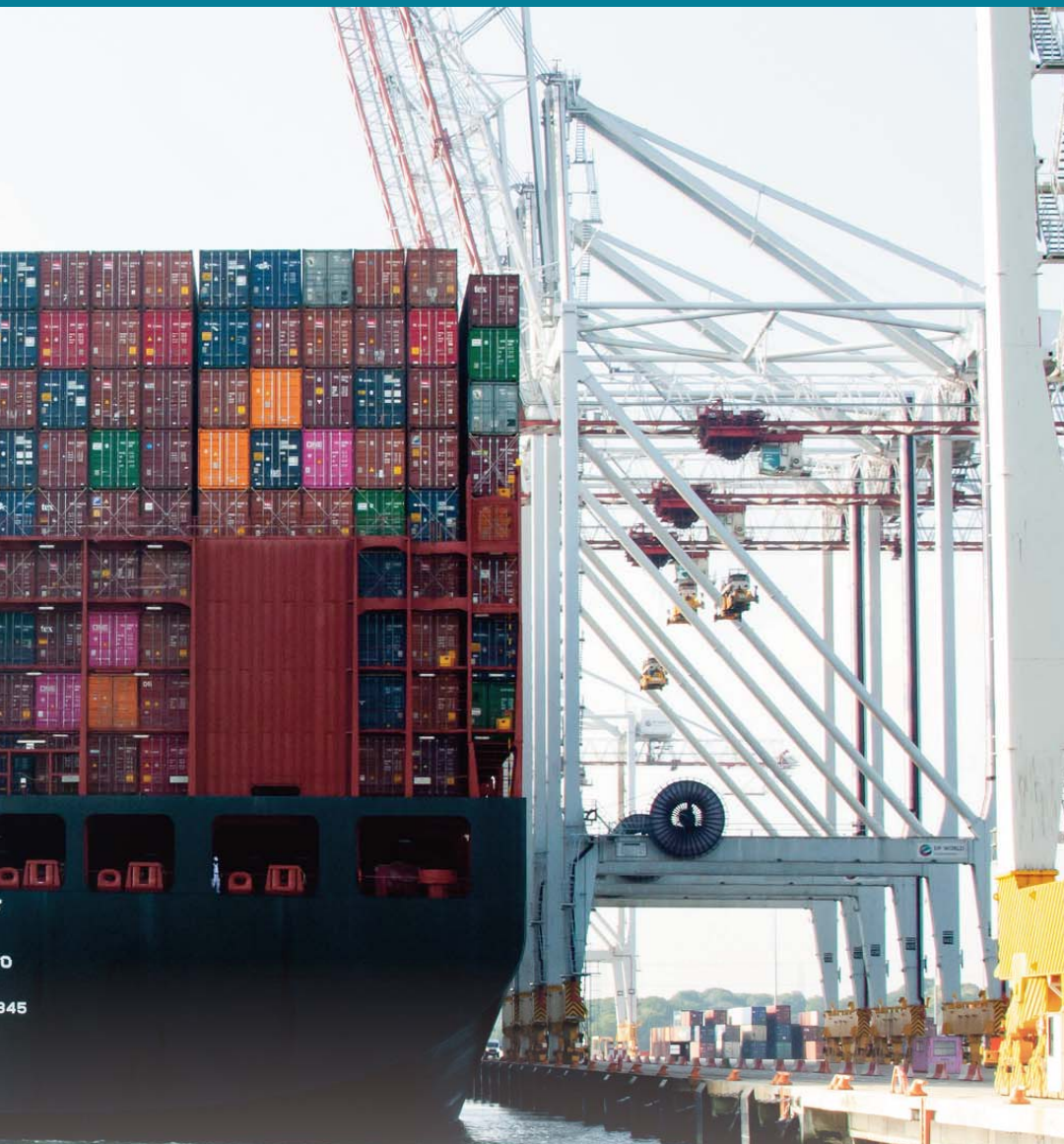

Support and prayers: Stella Maris Masses around the nation

Masses to celebrate the feast of Stella Maris, Our Lady Star of the Sea, took place in 15 dioceses around Great Britain, where the work of Apostleship of the Sea was upheld in prayer.





Hundreds of people attended Masses at cathedrals and churches from Aberdeen to Portsmouth, Norwich to Falmouth, during September and October. New chaplains and volunteer ship visitors were commissioned, and prayers were offered for the ministry of AoS.

Deacon Peter Barrigan, a port chaplain in Tees, spoke at a Stella Maris Mass in Middlesbrough.

He said, "Our ministry is to be present, and very often deliver little acts of kindness – provide seafarers with phone cards, rosaries, transport into town, and mainly to listen. These are brief encounters. Jesus' ministry consists of many brief encounters... Jesus spending time with strangers, listening to them, carrying out acts of kindness. We are in a privileged position to do this under the

protection of Our Blessed Lady Star of the Sea, Stella Maris."

Meanwhile, in Falmouth, Fr Brian Kenrick told the congregation, "Seafarers are often vulnerable, powerless and helpless, a long way from home, in need of a friendly face and a helping hand. They have a natural awareness of the presence of God and look to Mary, Star of the Sea, to guide them to a safe harbour. This love continues to them, as expressed and proclaimed by AoS chaplains and ship visitors."

And in Grimsby, the congregation of St Mary on the Sea was told by Fr Colum Kelly, "You prayed for AoS, engaged with our ministry and responded to it. The story isn't just a series of words, but is now part of you, and it has become richer because of the wonderful work done in this parish."

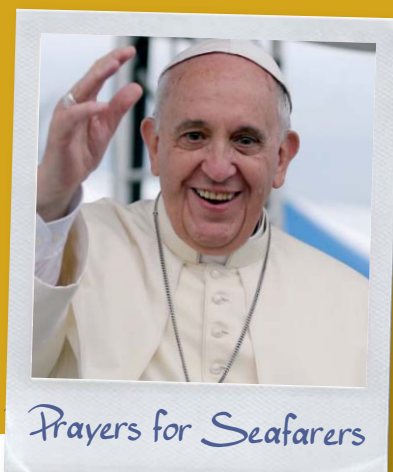
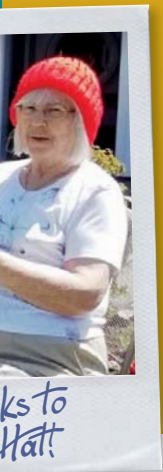

"I pray for them and their families as well as for the chaplains and volunteers of the Apostleship of the Sea," the Pontiff said during an address in St Peter's Square, Vatican.

'One seafarer commented that people sometimes forget the human element to shipping,' said Steve, 'but AoS and our many supporters definitely don't.'

Thousands of churches around the world celebrated Sea Sunday on 8 July. This was a day to remember and pray for seafarers, their families and all those who support them. The AoS flag flew above Westminster Cathedral, in London, and our staff, trustees and volunteers were out and about talking in parishes.

Port chaplain awarded British Empire Medal

Port chaplain Revd Roger Stone was awarded the British Empire Medal in 2018 for services to the pastoral care of seafarers.

Roger had been with us as a port chaplain since June 2010, and was our South West regional coordinator. He received his BEM in May and attended a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace in June. Roger said, “I am proud to work with the greatest and most effective maritime charity in the world, and I am privileged to serve so many wonderful seafarers from countries around the world.”

Roger was a permanent deacon in West Sussex before seeing a job advert for a port chaplain. Despite not knowing anything about shipping at the time, he embraced the challenge of doing something different.

In his years with AoS, Roger has supported a group of abandoned seafarers whose company hit financial trouble, helped nine fishermen who were found to be working

in slave-like conditions and comforted several seafarers following deaths at sea. He learnt some Tagalog and Visaya in order to communicate with the many Filipino seafarers he met and has organised pastoral visits by cardinals and bishops to ships docked near the Vatican.

AoS National Director Martin Foley said, “This award is richly deserved. Roger was a first-class chaplain, always willing to go the extra mile to support seafarers, fishermen and their families. I am delighted that his ministry has been recognised.

“Roger would be the first to acknowledge that his work would not be possible without the support of AoS colleagues, and I thank them, too, for their selfless dedication to serving seafarers and fishermen.”



What's coming up?

New magazine for seafarers

We're launching a new monthly magazine for seafarers, Stella Maris. Aiming to support the spiritual and mental health of seafarers, the magazine will carry faith reflections, practical advice and inspiring stories.

It will include the Sunday gospels with a commentary written specially for seafarers, as well as a self-help section covering issues like isolation and long-distance parenting. The magazine, initially in English and Ukrainian, will be available at seafarers' centres around the world and will be distributed to seafarers by ship visitors.



Celebrating 100 years of service

Apostleship of the Sea was founded in Glasgow in 1920 – and we're preparing to celebrate our centenary in the same city with chaplains from all over the world.

Back then, we ran hostels in all major port towns where seafarers could stay while their ships were in port, often for weeks at a time. Today, the turn-around time for ships in port is as little as a few hours – but our founding belief that every seafarer deserves support, friendship and a warm welcome remains at the heart of our ministry.

In October 2019, we'll be hosting a world congress in Glasgow with additional events around Great Britain. Workers in ports will be invited to join us for tea and a toast.

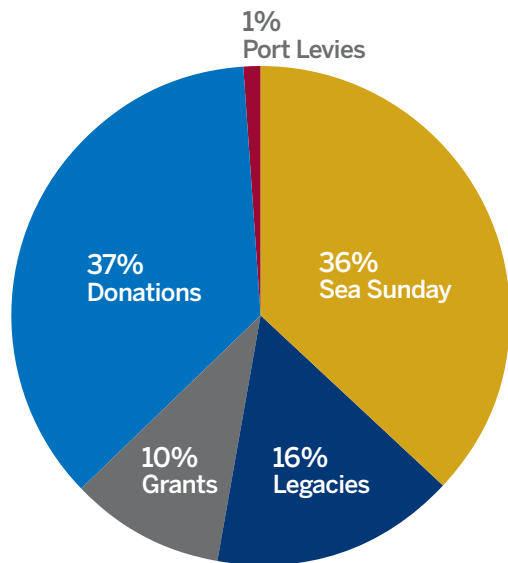

Donations and legacy gifts received in 2018 came to £1,560,056.

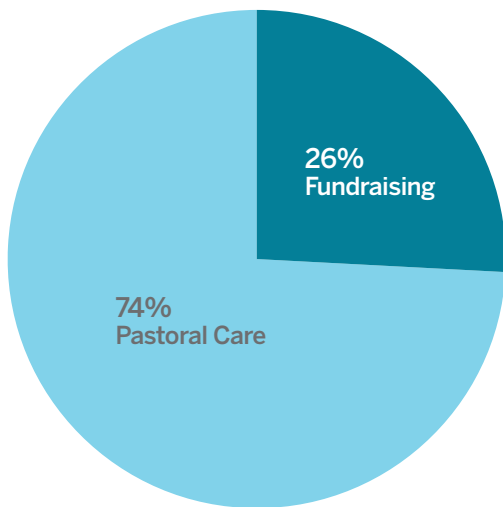

Legacy gift a vital support for injured seafarer

The generosity of a legacy donor has provided vital help for a Filipino seafarer in intensive care for a month.

Maureen Swan, from Twickenham, kindly left £5,000 in her will to AoS. Her compassion for seafarers meant that when long-serving seaman Rame Desamparado was injured in a car crash, he and his family received the help they needed.

Part of Mrs Swan's gift was used to pay the hospital costs of caring for Second Officer Rame, who was involved in the accident while on leave in the Philippines.

He had a long period of rehabilitation following his stay in intensive care. Mrs Swan's daughter, Kate, said, "I know my mother would be delighted to have supported a family in this way."

Alastair Emblem, AoS Legacy Officer, added, "Usually, income from legacies helps provide chaplaincy services to seafarers visiting UK ports. But occasionally we receive special requests to support seafarers in trouble. Mrs Swan's thoughtful gesture has brought relief to a poor and traumatised family on the other side of the world."
